### About Us

ooperative ESL Ministries (CESLM) Society is a group of local Calgary residents who have seen gaps in the integration of the immigrant, refugee, and international community and we are united in our determination to work towards bridging those gaps. We believe that ordinary, open-hearted Calgarians, with some training and support, can make a very positive difference in the lives of newcomers

#### **Our Mission**

Empowering churches to reach out in love to the immigrants and internationals in our community.

#### **Our Vision**

Churches are key leaders in welcoming and integrating newcomers to Canada.

#### What We Do

CESLM is an interdenominational Christian organization of volunteers from different backgrounds who advocate respect, understanding, and appreciation for people of all cultural, religious, and language backgrounds. We serve our community by training, networking, mobilizing, and inspiring hundreds of current and prospective volunteers who work directly with newcomers in Calgary. We support church ministries and community-based programs that serve newcomers to Canada by providing a variety of services.

**TRAINING AND RESOURCES:** Each year we deliver training programs and provide information and resources for volunteers from church and community organizations including:

- Reaching Out with English: a 30-hour intensive training program for volunteers in church-based ESL programs offered over 3 weekends each Fall.
- Spring Training: a full-day training event focused on current issues facing newcomers. Provides information and strategies for assisting newcomers plus an option for ESL facilitators to enhance their classroom skills -offered one Saturday each Spring.
- Intercultural Communication Workshops: half-day or evening workshops for groups wanting to raise intercultural awareness, learn about different cultural values, and improve cross-cultural communication skills. Workshops are delivered for your group at your church or organization by CESLM facilitators.

**BUILDING COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS:** Through our large community network we connect leaders and volunteers from church and community organizations with representatives from immigrant serving agencies and other supportive community organizations. We do this by providing:

- Annual Networking Breakfast: a half-day information and networking event for volunteers and staff from churches, immigrant serving agencies, and other supportive community organizations offered one Saturday morning each February.
- Information, contacts, and referrals to services for immigrants and other newcomers: connecting church and community-based programs to immigrant-serving agencies in Calgary and enabling program leaders to find appropriate specialized services (settlement services, counselling, further education, employment preparation, etc.) for their clients.

#### ADVOCATING FOR NEWCOMERS TO CANADA:



We strive to raise awareness among church and community groups, and encourage openness and involvement in reducing the barriers faced by immigrants and other newcomers in Calgary.

We do this by:

- Providing information and resources via our website and newsletter and through workshops, speakers, and presentations at our training and networking events.
- Encouraging interaction through Social Media: 'Like' us on Facebook, follow us on Twitter, sign up for our newsletter, or ask us questions via our website.

### President's Report



September 2016

#### Dear Friends.

September 23, 2016

As people of Faith we never overlook the Grace of God in our lives and in Cooperative English as a Second Language Ministries (CESLM) Society in particular (2 Corinthians 12:9). God has been with us through the past year, our fourteenth year of Service as unto the LORD (Ephesians 6:7). If

one person did not obediently heed the call of God we would not be part of this work today. God has mightily used Madeline Johnson to start and continue to progress CESLM Society in more ways than one.

The year in review can rightly be termed "Our Year of Innovation." God brought many issues to our attention as individuals, and as a group, and He gave us His Grace to explore and implement accordingly. These times were not without their challenges but we pulled through. It is work-in-progress, a journey.

Very early in the year, and with mixed feelings, we accepted the resignation of three valued Members of the CESLM Society Board of Directors. Rhonda McNallie who also doubled as our Bookkeeper was active in fundraising. Today she focuses more on her passion of running English language classes. Kathleen Siemens has been a resource person in our Reaching Out With English (ROWE). She continues to teach English language lessons at her convenience. Bethany Love-Ulriksen's work with immigrant women has been an asset to the Cooperative. We thank you all and wish you well in your present endeavours.

Our ROWE remains popular with ever increasing ratings for delivery, the year in review not being an exception. The timely theme of our Networking Breakfast Event "From Crisis to Community: Welcoming Refugees" was also the focus of our Spring Training. These resonated well with the participants as evidenced by the feedback. The events afforded many participants the opportunity to better equip themselves to relate better with, and serve this particular group, the Syrian Newcomers in our midst.

Funding in this past year posed a huge concern for CESLM Society, as we experienced one of the lowest giving seasons in the past five years. We seemed to be at a crossroads regarding the future of our organisation. Some partners have regularly supported the Cooperative, we continue to source new supporters and donors but we still seem to struggle to keep ourselves financially afloat. CESLM Society is looking at potential partnership with some organisations, and trying to flesh out what that would look like. CESLM Society visited with all of our regular donors, and presented each with a poster acknowledging their support over the years. Good thing is, we have never stopped trusting God, and He always shows up at the very point of our need (Jeremiah 29:11).

CESLM Society completed the second year of our association with Encompass Partnerships. We have established our presence and participation in the quarterly meetings and events. During the year in review, new dimensions to the partnership evolved. On November 17 2015, "Encounter Encompass" Night showcased all partners, CESLM Society inclusive. Also the "Community Round Table" discussion on March 24 2016 was where we as Encompass family shared the "broader needs of the community that surrounds us, and discuss and discover ways to better address those needs..."

During the year in review CESLM Society sought expertise in various ways to improve the Cooperative. We purchased board development books, Paula Maclean's board training series – videos and books, had conversations with Ed Temple, Janice Clark, and Harvey Matchullis. CESLM Society followed through with Harvey, and top on our list were recruiting new board members and implementing a plan for resource development. On June 18 2016, rather than facilitate our Strategic Planning Meeting, Harvey redirected the focus to clarifying CESLM Society identity, and re-



establishing a set of value statements about CESLM Society, our perception of ourselves and how we desire to be perceived. CESLM Society invited past Presidents and past Staff, with successful outcome, overall. CESLM Society promptly went into action to implement the teachings and learnings of that day. This is a continuous process and we are indeed grateful to Harvey.

James Edel, CESLM Society Vice President and I continued to foster a healthy working relationship, encouraging, learning from, and feeding off of one another, for the good of CESLM Society. Thank you James, you also opened up your home to host our August 2015 barbeque. And many thanks for the games and treats organised by your precious little ones. For the first time in years Norm Chambers had a rare chance to be hosted and served. We all had good fun.

Dale Fisher, our CESLM Society Secretary wears several hats. Dale continues to tirelessly host our bi-monthly meetings, and provide nutrition to go with it. Dale plays a key role in catering at all our events. Also Dale is a resource person at most of our training events, and her lectures, with delivery style, have scored high popularity as they seem to address where most of our Newcomers are at.

Amber Wylie-Moerman we are blessed to associate with you. You stepped into the role, and took up extra classes during the last ROWE. Into the bargain, the innovation you brought, for participants to teach their peers the communicative task was invaluable practice that scored successful outcome.

Roxy Meyers is gifted to source the right well sought-after speakers for our events. We appreciate all of your hard work towards putting these events together. And the ease with which we encounter these successes belies the magnitude and tremendous effort that goes into the planning and delivery.

In the past year Bev Chambers were several hats, serving as our go-to person for financial information and tasks, in addition to her role of Administrative Coordinator. Bev also organised and delivered our Intercultural Communication Workshop. At the end of this year in review Bev resigned from her role as Administrative Coordinator to take care of her dear husband, Norm, who took ill in April 2016. However with mixed feelings CESLM Society accepted Bev's resignation. But due to Bev's unwavering interest and dedication to the cause of CESLM Society she continues to provide volunteer assistance in areas where CESLM Society needs her expertise until such positions are filled. As a long time staff member and volunteer of CESLM Society, Bev has been, and continues to be an asset to the Cooperative.

### Training & Events



What a privilege it has been to work alongside passionate people who have big hearts for newcomers to Canada, no matter with what status they arrive. We continue to see the positive outcomes of investing time, talent and. And the need continues to grow, especially with the influx of refugees this past year.

**Reaching Out with English Training** enrolled fourteen participants who were empowered with tools to serve and support immigrants with learning English. We made some adjustments to the training materials and added a communicative task practice to better prepare participants for their teaching practicum. It is always a joy to see the confidence increase and blessing the participants receive from their students' teaching experience session. It's scary at first but they

settle in quite quickly. We are also grateful for the dedicated professional facilitators who continue to share from their vast experiences giving their best knowledge to equip these dedicated volunteers and organizations who offer their facilities for our events.

As the Syrian Refugee Crisis took centre stage in the news, we were compelled to focus our **Networking Breakfast** and **Spring Training** on how we as Christ followers are called to respond and welcome refugees to our city. From Crisis to Community: Welcoming Refugees focused on the bigger picture of why welcome refugees. We were given information on refugee sponsorship and heard a story of a recent Syrian immigrant. Immigrant serving agencies were given an opportunity to host mini-information sessions at their tables. Bringing resources together helps build a stronger vibrant community and we trust those community connections will continue to grow. Building Bridges: Responding to the Refugee Crisis featured speakers who brought expertise and could speak directly to the refugee crisis giving practical tools to help in our response. Both events were well attended and received with two-thirds being first time participants at our events.

Currently, we are aware of approximately 35 churches in Calgary who are actively providing a welcoming ministry to newcomers, whether it be conversation classes, ESL Bible studies, cooking classes, sewing classes, formal English classes, resume writing, citizenship classes or help with settlement. We continue to be amazed with the creativity and courageous risk taking shown by these churches as they open their doors and hearts to our newest Canadians. We would love to see this number grow as we know the waiting lists are long for accessing the necessary support through the government sponsored agencies. We also know that church sponsored classes go beyond education to friendship and meeting the needs of the whole person.

God continues to open up new opportunities and show us gaps for quality volunteer training resources. We continue to trust Him for provision to stand in the gap and offer equipping resources to churches and community groups that help them become the "key leaders in welcoming newcomers to Canada". We invite you to pray for us often as we seek to honour God and make Him famous among immigrants and all who work with them.
