PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Since this is my first annual report, I would like to explain why I became involved with Cooperative ESL Ministries by sharing my first newsletter article from November 2017.

In the fall of 2016, I sensed the Lord direct me to revisit the conversation that He had with the Samaritan woman at the well (John 4). While the disciples went into town to buy lunch, Jesus sat down to rest at the well. Seizing the opportunity for a life-changing conversation, Jesus asked the woman for a drink, then went on to promise living water to satisfy her soul forever. When the disciples returned with the groceries, all they could think about was how hungry they were when they saw Jesus talking to someone unworthy of their attention—for, in that time and place, women were low on the social ladder, particularly Samaritan women.

This was one of those moments when God's thinking clashed with humanistic thinking. While the disciples said, "Let's eat," Jesus said, "I have food to eat that you know nothing about." While the disciples overlooked this outsider, Jesus reached out. While the disciples wanted to head back to their own people in Judea (as quickly as possible), Jesus pointed to the fields around them that were ripe for harvest. As a result, a community was transformed!

It's tempting to ignore the opportunities we have, here and now, with waves of immigrants coming to Canada looking for a better life. We can feel threatened by new neighbours not like us—or, we can offer them hospitality, friendship, and respect. Through our influence, many may find not just a better life, but eternal life.

As followers of Jesus, let's pray that our government would have the wisdom and discernment to know who should settle in our great country. As the church, let's be the first to welcome these new residents. Only the Lord knows the eternal impact we can make as we reach out with the love and Good News of Jesus Christ!

I went looking for who was reaching out to new Canadians living in Calgary. Through a mutual friend, Laura Swart (who leads I-AM ESL), I was introduced to Madeline Johnson, founder of CESLM. Over the next few months, we too became friends and Madeline asked me to serve as president. My fresh appreciation for the encounter the Samaritans had with Jesus in John chapter 4, Madeline's vision based upon Jesus' prayer for unity in John chapter 17, this new friendship with Madeline and her husband Mel, and the Lord's stirring in my heart—all influenced my decision to say yes.

This role has been challenging and rewarding. Since serving with CESLM, I see more potential in how we can come alongside churches as they reach out to those who are new to our country. With one out of five people in Canada's population born elsewhere (Statistics Canada), there are many opportunities for followers of Jesus to roll out the welcome mat!



INTERCULTURAL MINISTRIES CONFERENCE—WITHOUT A PASSPORT

Intercultural Ministries Conference Report, October 13, 2018



We had an amazing group of people attend our Intercultural Ministries Conference on October 13. Keynote speaker, Bud Fuchs, gave an awesome presentation with key strategies for reaching newcomers in our neighbourhoods. More than thirteen churches were represented, with around 50 people in attendance.

With topics from cross-cultural strategies, to teaching ESL from a language learning perspective, using integrated Bible Study curriculum, to how to present the Gospel to newcomers, and an amazing story from an immigrant

father on the stress and anxiety of integrating into a new culture—all had something to offer us as we learn to reach out to newcomers in our neighbourhoods, churches, and workplaces.

LOCAL ESL PROGRAM STORIES—REACHING OUT TO NEWCOMERS

Meeting the needs of newcomers in Canada is more than just teaching them English, giving them resources, and sending them out into society to become "Canadian." It's about showing them God's love by walking alongside them as they live this journey among us. It's about accepting them as they are, and not forcing our cultural values on them, but rather loving them as Christ loves us—unconditionally.

The following is a story told by the Harvest Hills Alliance Church ESL program coordinator, Donna Zamiski, and church member Charlotte Engler, on how their church is making a difference as they reach out to newcomers in their community.

HARVEST HILLS ALLIANCE CHURCH



ESL WITH HEART AND LOVE

It took a couple of years for Harvest Hills Alliance Church (HHAC) to meet their sponsored Syrian Refugee, a single woman with two children, who finally arrived in Calgary in the fall of 2018. The family spoke Arabic and had absolutely no knowledge of English.

Having taught ESL at HHAC for several years, [being responsible for English language and acculturation instruction], I quickly recognized the difference between the two cultures and the loneliness the family felt.

Then it occurred to me to ask another Arabic speaking woman, [who had previously attended classes at HHAC and then continued at Agape Language Centre achieving Level 4], to help translate for the refugee woman and her kids. She also agreed to help as her conversation partner in the ESL classroom. As well, Charlotte, a member of HHAC congregation, came alongside this new refugee family. She not only accompanied this family to medical appointments but went beyond just driving this family places to get settled—she took them to ESL knitting/crochet classes at the New Canadian Friendship Centre, attended a woman's retreat with the mom, and introduced them to her grandchildren by inviting them in to play and socialize, as well as share tea and help her with English homework—a great way to integrate a newcomer into Canadian culture.

Quickly frustration changed to smiles, hugs, relaxed chatter, and even laughter and food exchanges as many church members became involved in helping this family settle into Calgary. The whole church now stays informed of the family's needs making sure someone is always there to lend a hand. The language will come with time! In the meantime, the new family is comforted and feels accepted in the community.

ROSE'S STORY: NOT JUST A SETTLEMENT, BUT A SPIRITUAL JOURNEY TO CHRIST

Rose is a very hard worker—working 55 hours a week at two jobs. She is a widow and has one son. She started coming to our Thursday evening Conversation Club to improve her English. Every week she sat with a volunteer in a small group and practiced English. Rose often wondered why they took the time volunteering to help New Canadians learn English. She also couldn't understand why they were so kind to her, encouraging her in life.

Over the next few months, Rose started attending the Sunday ESL Bridges Class to study English, Canadian culture, and Jesus' life. Rose continued to observe the Christian volunteers as they befriended her, invited her into their homes, and took her camping for a weekend with the volunteer teachers and students.

Eventually, through a Christian friend, Rose became a follower of Jesus and was baptized! Now she is growing in her faith. She attends a Saturday ESL Bible study. The students in the Bible study are becoming good friends and enjoy spending time together.

For a short time, one of her jobs kept Rose from coming to the church services, classes, and events on weekends—so, she changed jobs to keep her weekends free. She looks forward to worshipping with other believers in the weekend church service. She says she feels so happy when she praises God. Rose shares

her love for Jesus with friends and family. She told her sister, "You should come to church with me. You will feel joy in your heart."

Monday to Friday, Rose works at a daycare. A large part of her job is changing diapers. She says, "Every time I change a little one's diaper, I tell them 'I love you'. And as they get older, they respond, 'I love you.' I pray for them. And we sing about God's good gifts." Her boss is also a Christian and encourages Rose in her faith.

Rose's settlement journey, which started with a very kind ESL volunteer—became a spiritual journey to Jesus.
